
Redditch Roadway Arts:

Winyates and Matchborough Walking Trail



What is Redditch Roadway Arts?

Roadway Arts is an outdoor gallery of professional artwork installed in underpasses and bus shelters across Redditch. The designs celebrate local history, community, sport, nature and the environment. The first underpass mural was completed in Redditch Town Centre in 2007. The collection now contains 32 different artworks in 53 locations.

Many of the artworks have been created with the involvement of local residents, community groups and schools. The artworks brighten up an underpass or bus stop, making them more pleasant to use. For more information, go to www.redditchbc.gov.uk/roadwayarts. This trail is a chance to look at some of the artwork more closely, and learn about what inspired the artists. You will also see other interesting things along the way!

Time to complete: Approx 1.5 hours.

Walking distance: Approx 1.5 miles.

The trail is on flat tarmac paths and is suitable for wheelchairs and pushchairs.

Starting Point: Bus stop on Winyates Way, between Ibstock Close and Lassington Close.

How to find the starting point: From Redditch Town Centre, catch the 58 bus. After you leave Church Hill and cross over the Coventry Highway, get off at the second bus stop.

Alternatively, catch the 57 bus. The trail starts at the first bus stop after Winyates Centre.

Keep Safe

- Don't follow the trail by yourself- take a responsible adult with you.
- Take extra care next to rivers, streams and ponds- and never go into the water.
- Always use a pavement when walking along the road, even if it seems quiet.
- If you need to cross the road, use a crossing point like an underpass, pelican crossing or zebra crossing. If there isn't one nearby, find a safe place to cross. Look all around for traffic, and let all traffic pass before you cross. When it is safe, go straight across the road- but never run!

What you need to take with you to complete the trail:

Essential:

- 🔲 This guide
- A clipboard, or something else to lean on when you are writing your answers
- A pen or pencil for completing the questions

Other things you might like to take:

- A drink and a snack
- Coloured pencils or pens
- A watch to time how long it takes you to complete the trail
- A copy of the Redditch Walking and Cycling map (available at the Town Hall and other Redditch Borough Council One Stop Shops)









Bus Stop 5: 'Curiouser and Curiouser #2'


